II. What HIV does to the body

- A. Definitions of HIV, AIDS.
- B. HIV damages the Immune System: there is no defense.
- C. <u>"The test"</u> that you will take is not a test for HIV or AIDS it is a test for HIV antibodies.
 - 1. "Window period" and the interpretation of test results.
 - 2. The advantages of finding your HIV status early.
 - D. Possible <u>signs and symptoms</u> of an HIV infection.



III. Transmission and the reality of infection:

- A. You CANNOT get HIV from casual contact (kissing, handshakes, working with someone with HIV/AIDS).
- B. 3 very specific behaviors:
 - 1. Unprotected sex.
- 3. Infected mother to child.
- 2. Blood-to-Blood.
- C. 4 fluids with a high concentration of HIV:
 - 3. 1. Blood.
- 2. Semen (includes pre-cum)
- 3. Vaginal fluids.
- 4. Breast milk.

IV. Prevention is possible and realistic:

- A. Can we talk about abstinence with our young children?
- B. A latex condom with water-based lubricant is effective when use *properly* and *consistently*. Remember: 1. <u>Latex</u> only, 2. Check the <u>expiration date</u>, 3. <u>Open carefully</u>, 4. <u>Press the air out</u> of the tip when rolling the condom down the erect penis, 5. Be sure to <u>pull out</u> when the penis is still hard, 6. <u>Dispose</u> of carefully.

V. Morality issues

- A. Are we giving <u>clients a choice</u> in sexual activity? How are we affecting the families and children of all involved?
- B. Does ignorance equal death?
- C. Are there some <u>spiritual</u> considerations?
- D. Is there informed consent?
- E. When do we talk about testing for HIV infection?
- F. Who is to <u>blame</u>? Who feels <u>quilty</u>?
- G. Are you thinking about your wife/girl friend/children?
- G. Please help us elevate the care, compassion and hope of <u>people</u> <u>living with HIV/AIDS</u>.
